Water Restrictions Change April 1

Pledging to Save Water Could Win You a Prius v!

Benicia City Council adopted emergency outdoor watering restrictions that limit watering by automatic sprinkler systems change to no more than three days per week, **April 1 - October 15.**

- Addresses ending in **ODD** numbers (1,3,5,7,9,) can water on **Mondays, Wednesdays** and **Fridays** only
- Addresses ending in **EVEN** numbers (0,2,4,6,8) can water on **Tuesdays, Thursdays** and **Saturdays** only
- Watering on these days is allowed **before 8:00 AM** and **after 7:00 PM** only

Exemptions include:

- Efficient, low-volume irrigation (such as drip irrigation)
- Watering container plants
- Hoses with automatic shut-off nozzles
- New drought-tolerant landscaping (may be watered four days per week for the first year)



Law Day Contests



May 1 is Law Day. The American Bar Association first proposed the idea of Law Day in 1957 to celebrate the rule of law. The City of Benicia has celebrated Law Day since 2006. This year's Law Day theme is "Magna Carta: Symbol of Freedom Under Law" honoring the 800th Anniversary of the sealing of Magna Carta in 1215.

The Magna Carta contains many of the fundamental principles of our government. American Bar Association President William Hubbard stated "Over the centuries Magna Carta has become the embodiment of the principle that no person, no matter how powerful, is above the law. Colonists took with them to America the idea that the sovereign must recognize and respect the rights of the individual. During the American Revolution, Magna Carta was cited for its symbolic significance by Thomas Paine, Benjamin Franklin, and Thomas Jefferson, among many others." To celebrate this important document and Law Day, the City of Benicia Open Government Commission and the City Attorney's Office are hosting community activities.

Following last year's successful Law Day art contests, the Open Government Commission has expanded this year's contest to include essays. Everyone is invited to create art that features the Magna Carta. Other celebratory activities now include events based on age.



The 4th annual National Mayor's Challenge for Water Conservation runs **April 1 - 30** and Benicia is joining the nationwide challenge to be the most "water wise".

Mayor Elizabeth Patterson and the Benicia City Council are joining mayors across the country in asking residents to make a commitment to conserve water and cut pollution by taking part in a national contest aimed at drastically slashing water and energy use across the nation - and in return residents are entered to win a new Toyota Prius v, water saving fixtures, and

Middle school students: Write a one page essay or a poem on the subject "how George Washington was defending the Magna Carta during the Revolutionary War"

High school students: Write a one page essay or a poem on "How English liberties that originated in the Magna Carta are being preserved by the United States"

Adults: Create a poem or other writing featuring the Magna Carta.

Art entries will be judged by members of the City's Arts and Culture Commission. Essays will be judged by members of the City's Library Board. Poems will be judged by the City's Poet Laureate. All entries must be received by the City Attorney's Office by **May 1**. The winners of the contest will be announced at the City Council meeting on **May 19**. Thanks to the generosity of local attorneys, the winners will receive Benicia related prizes.

The City's Open Government Commission oversees the City's Open Government Ordinance. The purpose of the Open Government Ordinance is "to make it easier for people to access city government so that they may be more informed about what their city is doing and so that they may be involved in a more meaningful and knowledgeable way. Open meetings, easier access to public records, ethical guidelines and a watchdog commission will help increase the public trust and confidence in the city government and will increase the public awareness and knowledge about their government. A well-educated public and ethical officials are essential to good government." The Commission invites members of the public to its meetings or to visit them at the City of Benicia's table at the Farmer's Market, opening **April 30**. If you would like to help with the Law Day efforts or sponsor a

hundreds of other prizes.

The Wyland Mayor's Challenge for Water Conservation, **April 1 - 30**, is a non-profit national community service campaign to see which leaders can best inspire their residents to make a series of choices through easy-to-use online pledges to reduce water and energy usage.

Mayor Patterson is encouraging Benicia residents to conserve water, save energy, and reduce pollution on behalf of Benicia at www.mywaterpledge.com/national throughout the month of April. Energy is available to provide information and answer questions every Tuesday from 3:30 - 5:30 PM through **April 14** at the Benicia Public Library, 150 East L Street.

The Benicia City Council voted to join MCE, a not-for-profit, community-based organization that partners with PG&E to provide your electric service. MCE offers choices for 50-100% renewable energy from solar, wind, bioenergy, geothermal and hydroelectricity. By creating market competition, MCE allows you to choose your energy provider and reduce the environmental impact associated with the energy your use, all at stable rates.

Aside from low rates and cleaner energy generation, not much will change. PG&E will still handle electric delivery, maintain the power lines, read your meter and send your monthly bill. Your bill will include charges for both PG&E electric delivery and MCE electric generation. You will never be double-billed for your service because MCE's low generation rates will replace PG&E's.

PG&E's 22%* renewable energy: *Most recently reported by PG&E. To meet state mandates, PG&E's renewable energy content will increase over time.

To buy your energy from PG&E, opt out of MCE online or by phone

Your Savings with MCE:

Based on proposed rates, the average home will save approximately \$17 per year with MCE's Light Green 50% renewable energy service and the average business will save approximately \$166 per year with MCE's Light Green 50% renewable energy service. Electric delivery rates are the same for MCE and PG&E customers. Electric generation rates are different for MCE and PG&E customers.



Billed as the Greatest Show (and Tell) on Earth, the Benicia Mini Maker Faire on **Saturday, March 28** from 10:00 AM - 5:00 PM is a family-friendly showcase of invention, creativity and resourcefulness, and a celebration of the Maker Movement.

The first annual Faire will feature a spectacular lineup of makers, performers, food vendors, and speakers. Expecting over 3,000 attendees from across the Bay Area, the event is a celebration of do-it-yourself spirit and hands-on making.

More than 70 exhibits, performances and presentations are booked for the event, including:

- Dale Dougherty, founder of Make Magazine and Maker Faire will be making a special appearance
- Robots that walk, talk, move about, teach computer programming and even solve puzzles, including an appearance by R2D2
- Build and launch paper rockets up to 300 feet in the air
- Learn to solder your own LED robot badge

On March 17, a Driving Under the Influence (DUI) jury trial was held at the Benicia High School in the Performing Arts Building in front of approximately 200 Benicia High School students. This was an actual "real" trial heard by Solano County Superior Court Judge Bradley E. Nelson. Officer Keffer was the arresting officer in the case. This is part of a court program to discourage drinking and driving.

Attitudes on Water Conservation

As California enters a fourth year of drought, a new statewide poll reveals that the vast majority of Californians, some 90 percent are willing to make significant changes to conserve water both inside and out, and more than 80 percent believe it's important to conserve water regardless of whether the state is in a drought or whether conservation is mandated by local water agencies.



Save Our Water found that more than 80 percent of Californians view the drought and water shortages as "extremely" or "very" serious problem. Some 86 percent of polled residents believe that California is in a state of persistent water shortage. The polling also indicates that Californians nearly universally agree that the drought is the most pressing problem facing the state and is more concerning than the economy, education, health care costs and taxes.

What can you do to conserve water? Here are a few tips:

- Follow the landscape water restrictions. Until **March 31**, landscaping watering is only allowed one day per week, either Saturday or Sunday. Starting on April 1st watering will be allowed up to 3 days per week. See more details [above](#).
- Instead of turning on your whole irrigation system to water a few dry spots, try hand watering those areas with a hose equipped with a hose nozzle to directly target the spots that need watering
- Cover pools and hot tubs to reduce evaporation
- Run the dishwasher and washing machine with full loads only
- Replace old, inefficient appliances with new efficient models. Go to www.solanosaveswater.org to apply for rebates
- Don't let the water run while shaving, brushing teeth or rinsing dishes

The goal was to show teenagers not just the dangers of driving under the influence, but the financial costs and legal consequences of a real-world conviction.

Conducting a real DUI trial in a high school setting is an innovative strategy to help reduce community alcohol problems, including motor vehicle crashes. Students will witness the legal consequences of drinking and driving, and learn about the defendant's arrest, jailing, public trial and, if convicted, the imposed fees and penalties.

During the trial, Nelson along with a Jury of students found the 24-year old defendant guilty of driving under the influence of alcohol. The case stemmed from a October 14, 2014 incident in which the defendant, a Marinez resident, was stopped by Benicia Police Officer Keffer in the 100 block of West G Street. A breath test revealed that the defendant's blood alcohol level was .14 and .15, which is over the legal limit of .08.

At the conclusion of the trial Officer Keffer held a question and answer session for the students. Students who chose to do so also experienced performing field sobriety tests that were administered by Officer Keffer.

Benicia High School is one of several high schools in Solano County that will have the rare opportunity to witness an actual DUI trial during the school year. The DUI Court in the Schools Program is a cooperative effort involving the Superior Court, District Attorney's Office, Public Defender's Office, County Probation Department, and participating school districts in Solano County. - *Police Department*

Wind, Water, Land

The Arts and Culture Commission of the City of Benicia was thrilled to unveil Wind, Water, Land, last Saturday at the City of Benicia's Community Center. The art serves as the focus of a permanent eco-sustainable exhibit and educational display in the LEED-Gold certified building. Wind, Water, Land is an artistic vehicle of glass and metal comprised of a significant amount of re-purposed and re-cycled materials. A theme of "wind, water, land", which is also the title of the piece, was selected to portray characteristics of the City of Benicia. The intent of the artwork, funded by a Community Sustainability Commission Grant and managed by the Public Art Committee of the Arts and Culture Commission, is to serve as a catalyst for reflection and action regarding the effects of climate change. Wind, Water, Land was collaboratively designed and created by local Benicia artists who are internationally/nationally known.

The lead artist on the project was Brian Giambastiani, a metal and glass artist, who drew the conceptual design. He was joined in creating the piece by glass artists Micheal Nourot, Nicholas Nourot, and David Lindsay, and metal artists David Nourot and Mike Kendall. The metal and glass are further enhanced by backlighting, designed by Larry Lauber. The story of the creation of this piece from the conceptual drawing, through the

approval process (required by the City of Benicia's Public Art Program), to the actual formation of the artwork itself, was filmed by highly renowned local film maker, John Beck. Vignettes of the film are available to view on the screen next to the artwork.

The art work is accompanied by an interactive component, consisting of informative and educational questions that provoke and enlighten citizens about the realities of climate change, energy consumption, and water usage. Wind, Water, Land is a significantly sized work of art, consisting of five 3'x 5' panels that consume the length of a long wall near the reception desk at the Community Center. The Community Center was chosen as the site by the Public Art Committee because of its environmental integrity and because it has the capacity to reach citizens of all ages.

The reception and unveiling, held on March 21, featured opening remarks by Patty Gavin, current Chair of the Arts and Culture Commission, who served as Chair of the Public Art Committee during the inception and creation of this art. Mayor Elizabeth Patterson and Community Sustainability Commission Chair Kathy Kerridge joined Ms. Gavin at the podium. Following their remarks, the public was invited to the unveiling ceremony, where the finished work, breathtaking in its artistry and execution, was shown to the public for the first time.

Additional artworks by the participating artists were on exhibit, informational booths on water and energy savings, a children's eco-sustainable art workshop, and several screenings of the documentary film throughout the day entertained over 150 people who came to the ceremony.

As art inspires and speaks to the heart and mind of the viewer, the goal of Wind, Water, Land is to promote environmental awareness, eco-sustainable education, and inspire and resonate for years to come. - *Library*

Wind, Water, Land

The conceptual design starts with the viewer seeing five panels of

salvaged, repurposed, and recycled materials. As the viewer's eye moves along the panels, the piece transforms into strata conveying wind, water, land. Sky is formed from chunks of slumped and textured glass. In the sky, clouds, and leaning cattails of recycled metal and glass, depict wind. Dichroic bits, encased in glass balls, float on plasma cut metal to form water. Rebar strips convey current. Nuts and bolts meld to shape land. In converting salvaged, repurposed, and recycled materials into a symphony of wind, water, land, this public piece expresses the magnificence of our earth, while helping us be mindful of its fragility.
