**FREE WATER CONSERVATION WORKSHOP:** The great California drought is here! In response to our serious water shortage, the City of Benicia in partnership with Republic Services Inc., is asking residents to conserve water. Now is the time for you to take action and practice water conservation.



To help you do your best at saving water, the City of Benicia is hosting a free workshop called **Water Conservation: Every Drop Counts:**

**EBOLA – UNDERSTANDING THE FACTS:** According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Ebola is not spread through casual contact; therefore, the risk of an outbreak in the U.S. is very low. Ebola can only be contracted in the following manner:

- By touching the blood or body fluids of a person who is sick with or has died from Ebola.
- By touching contaminated objects, like needles.
- By touching infected animals, their blood or other body fluids, or their meat.
- You cannot get Ebola through air, water or food.

Symptoms of Ebola Include:

- Fever (greater than 38.6°C or 101.5°F)
- Abdominal (stomach) pain
- Unexplained hemorrhage (bleeding or bruising)
- Diarrhea

**V**ALERO DONATES TO LOCAL ORGANIZATIONS: At a recent ceremony, Valero Benicia Refinery presented 20 children's charities, nominated by refinery employees, with grants totaling \$345,000. The funds were raised through the 2014 Valero Texas Open and Benefit for Children Golf Classic, held in San Antonio, Texas, last March.

"These annual Benefit for Children grants help provide a wide range of services and opportunities for children through the work of local nonprofit organizations," said Vice President and General Manager John Hill. "Since 2001, the Benicia Refinery has awarded over \$4.2 million in awards through this employee-nominated grant process."

The 2014 Benefit for Children Golf Classic, together with the Valero Texas Open, raised \$9 million for charity. Valero's title sponsorship of the event began 13 years ago and it has helped raise \$90.5 million for charity since then, making the tournament among the top charitable fundraisers on the PGA Tour.

Dollars raised through these events are distributed to locations where Valero has operations; local employees then nominate the children's charities for a possible grant.

**FIRE DEPARTMENT OPEN HOUSE:** On Saturday, October 11, Benicia Fire Department hosted its annual Open House/Public Safety Day. The event was scheduled from 11:00AM to 3:00PM, although people began to show up as early as 10:30! The first arriving 100 children were presented with a special fire safety gift bag, along with a traditional red fire helmet.



In addition to fire personnel, the attendees were able to talk with representatives from PG&E, CHP, Benicia Police Department, and Benicia Police/Fire Dispatch about safety related items. Representatives were also on hand from the Benicia Emergency Response Team and the Benicia Amateur Radio Club, providing information about their programs. Assisting with the day's activities were volunteer members of the Benicia Fire Department who shared information on their organization, as well. The Benicia Valero Fire Department was in attendance, demonstrating rope rescue skills and hoisting people in the air on their rope systems.



Over 800 people attend this year's event and with the assistance of individuals from BERT, almost 500 hot dogs were cooked and served! Plans are already in the works for next year's event. – *Fire Department*





**COMMUNITY CHOICE AGGREGATION NEWS:** The City Council meeting to review the proposal to join the MCE Community Choice Aggregation Program is **Tuesday, November 4** at 8:00 PM at City Hall.

Community Choice Aggregation (CCA) agencies purchase and/or develop clean electricity on behalf of residents, businesses, and municipal accounts and PG&E delivers that electricity, maintains the energy grid, and provides customer service and billing.

The City of Benicia has made application to join the Marin Clean Energy (MCE) CCA. If the City Council votes to join, Benicia residents and businesses will automatically be included in the program unless they opt out during a 5-month notification process. The City Council has requested additional independent financial and legal risk assessment of a Membership Analysis completed by MCE for the City indicating that if Benicia joined MCE it could result in reduced electricity rates and greenhouse gas emissions. At this meeting, the City Council will review the independent analyses of MCE's report and discuss whether the City should join MCE. The City Council is seeking community input on pros and cons of joining MCE. 

**DROUGHT SURCHARGE INFORMATION:** After three consecutive years of below normal rainfall, the State of California is facing a severe drought emergency. Due to actions necessary to help ensure the health and safety of the community and the financial integrity of the Water Enterprise Fund, the City Council passed the Drought Surcharge on September 16, 2014. Surcharge rates will go into effect on or about 10/15/14 and it will first be reflected on November water bills. As the water system is funded solely by customer water bills, the drought surcharge was adopted to recover drought-related costs, which includes buying more expensive water on the open market.

It is anticipated that the City’s largest water customer, Valero, will pay 50% of drought-related costs, while the other half will be recovered through surcharge rates. Similar to the City’s base water rates, the surcharge rates increase as customer usage increases as shown in the table below. The additional water cost due to surcharge can be minimized by reducing water usage.

The surcharge was developed using expected drought-related costs. Those costs include additional water purchases, increased water conservation efforts, and reduced operating revenue which have placed severe financial pressure on the Water Enterprise Fund. The drought surcharge is temporary and will be in effect until water supply conditions have stabilized and the City Council determines that sufficient drought-related costs have been recovered.

As shown in the table above, customers already receiving the "low income senior citizen" water discount will not have to pay Tier 1 drought surcharge. (To qualify for this discount customers must be age 60 or older AND be enrolled in [PG&E's CARE](#) program.)

Water usage has been reduced by 18% since January, which has allowed the City to store enough water for 2015 in case it is another drought year. Everyone is encouraged to continue to conserve as much water as possible, and only irrigate your yard on Saturday or Sunday until March 31, 2015. – *Public Works*

**BERT GRADUATION:** On Saturday, October 18, participants in Benicia Emergency Response Team (BERT) Class 29 were on hand at the Benicia Fire Museum for the final day of their training. During the morning, students participated in a series of field exercises to culminate their training. Some of the exercises focused on how to secure utilities, conduct debris lifting and removal, perform basic medical assessment and treatment, and operate a fire extinguisher.



After the completion of the skills stations, all of the students assembled inside the museum for closing comments and the presentation of their course completion certificates. Congratulations to all of the participants of BERT Class 29. They are all now better prepared to care for themselves and those around them during a disaster event.

- Nutrient pollution removal; BOD = 98.8 % TSS = 98.5 %




**Water System Operations & Maintenance:**

**Water Usage:**

City-owned facilities have reduced water use by 36% since March. Below is the current usage of treated water (MG) delivered throughout the City through September as compared to treated water demand in 2012 and 2013. The purple line shows the demand if customers conserved 20% of their usage (in September, customers conserved 20.5% compared to that same time period in 2013):
